The Challenge

Delays in HIV services caused by COVID-19 have had a negative impact on aging PLHIV.

Conducting face-to-face HIV education had become challenging under COVID-19 restrictions.

Our Response

15 trained volunteers living with HIV have coached aging PLHIV on technology, such as how to use social media, the e-Health app, online consultation for better health record keeping and staying connected with the community.

Developed 5 videos with key opinion leaders (KOL) to promote the importance of quality of life for PLHIV and the U=U concept.

The Results

90%

of participants can use technology such as eHealth app, online consultation and instant drug consultation.

people have been educated by volunteers on the concept of U=U to help eliminate HIV-related stigma.

Increasing Digitalized Access To HIV Prevention Education For Young Key Populations In Cambodia
Jan 2022 – Mar 2023

The Challenge

There is a lack of comprehensive HIV education for key populations, including the youth. Training to leverage virtual channels for prevention outreach to young key populations is also insufficient.

Our Response

The designed project aims to integrate the concept of digital solutions into HIV/AIDS prevention programming. KHANA trained Community Health Workers (CHWs) on 3-2-1 services through:

- Content development workshops for CSOs and community health workers;
- Promotion of the 3-2-1 services amongst young key populations;
- Development of 5 categories of messages and uploaded into 3-2-1 service; and
- Capacity building trainings on 3-2-1 service access and utilization amongst CSOs and community networks of young key populations.

The Results

145

participants took part in the training (115 in-person and 30 virtually).

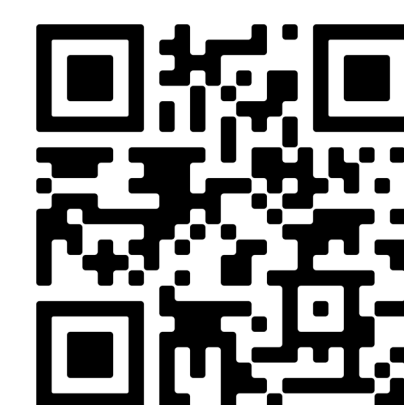

YKPs were engaged and actively listened to 3-2-1 services and received key HIV prevention information.

Our Story

This project has allowed us to engage with high government officials such as National AIDS Authorities, National Center for HIV/AIDS, Dermatology and STD, Provincial Health Departments. We have also expanded partnership and cooperation with Mobile Network Operators to better target audiences.

The Challenge

The HIV testing process can be challenging due to anxiety, stigma, or the inability to physically travel to a clinic. COVID-19 has worsened this problems.

Our Response

- Love2Test is an online platform that provides a user-friendly solution for key populations to schedule HIV testing appointments with local clinics. Our mobile application simplifies the appointment booking process, making it convenient and accessible.
- We believe that our platform's ease of use will encourage more people to get tested and pursue early treatment. With fast turnaround results and earlier treatment, users can stay proactive about their health and take steps to know their status, get prevented, and stay safe.

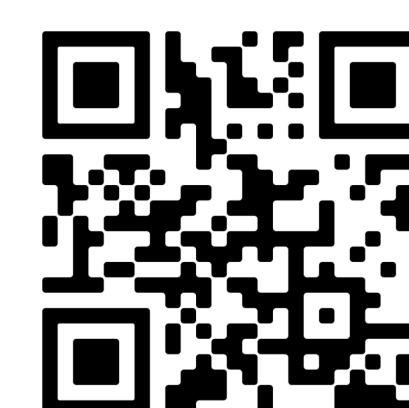

The Challenge

Awareness of HIV prevention and access to preventive medicine is still insufficient among MSMs in the Philippines.

Our Response

- Engage MSMs through anonymous online community influencers using sex-positive messaging.
- Collaboration with the content creators to raise awareness on HIV prevention and access to the preventive medication.

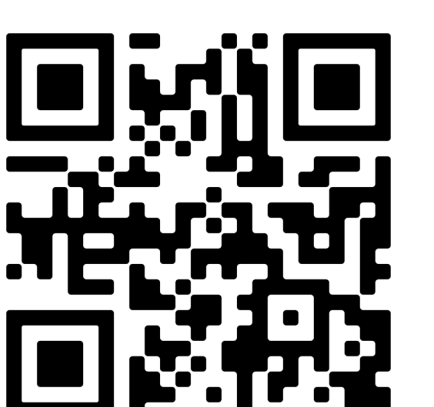
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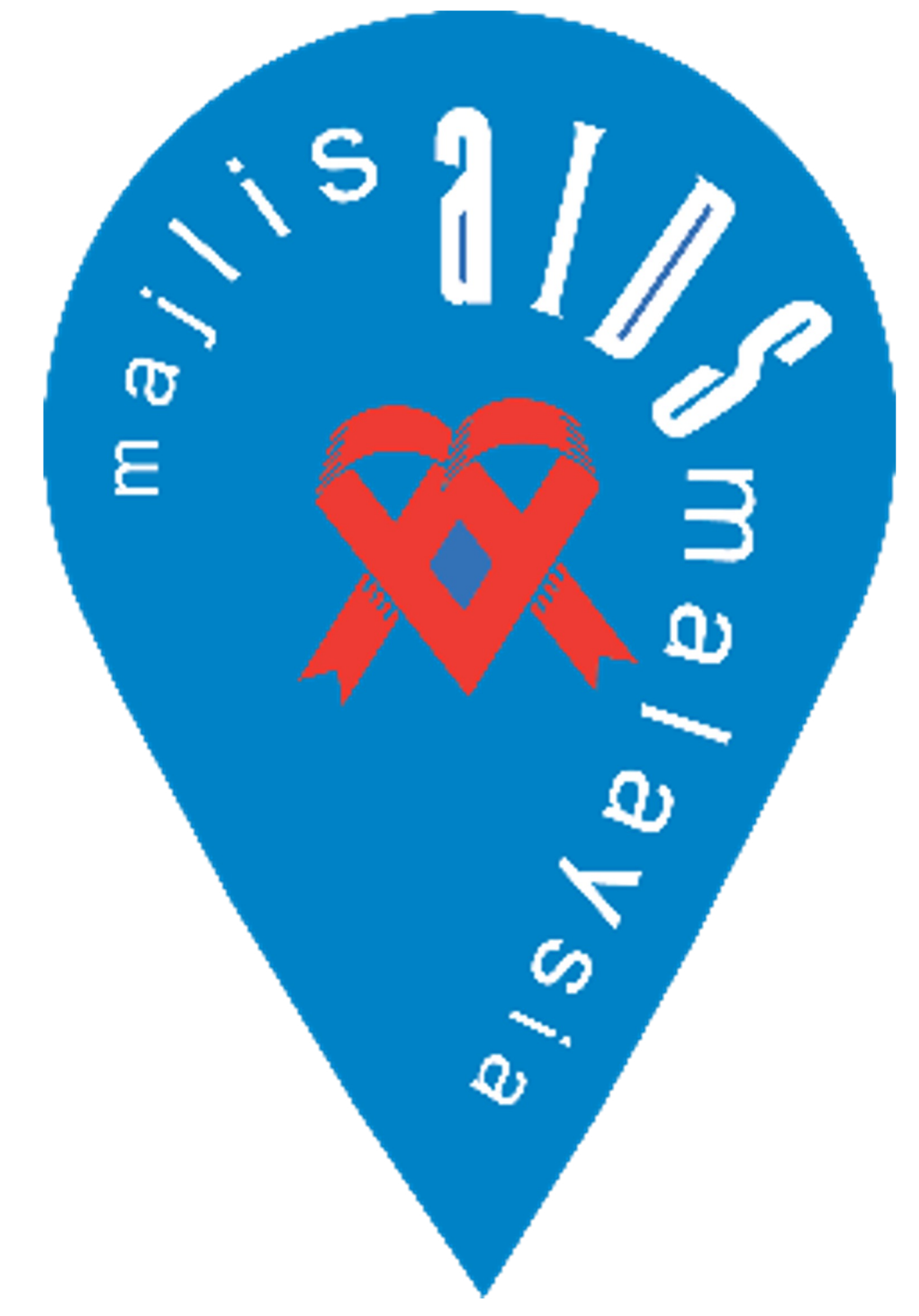

The Challenge

- Perceived stigma and discrimination by HCPs were a major barrier to facility-based HIV testing among MSMs, TGs and sex workers in Malaysia.
- COVID-19 restrictions and movement control order by the government.

Our Response

- To determine whether the availability of an online HIVST dissemination service model among key populations is feasible and acceptable in Malaysia.
- To explore the feasibility and success of the recruitment strategies for engaging infrequent and non-testers MSM, TG, sex workers and their sex partners, PWID & PWUD.

registered users recorded from November 2020 to December 2022.

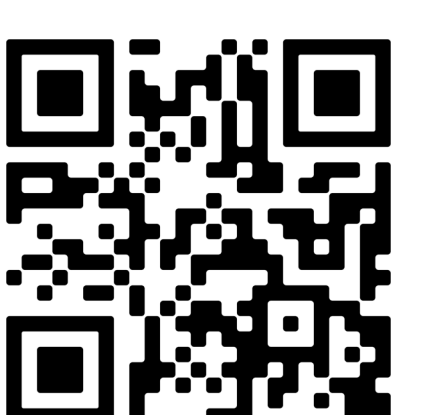
HIV Self-Test kits were sent out to participants of all key populations (including MSM, SW, TG, and PWID/PWUD).

New approaches such as JOM TEST are much needed to serve those who do not yet know their HIV status, and to deliver accessible testing, prevention and treatment services as part of the broader self-care movement.

The Challenge

- Stigma and Discrimination (S&D) is a barrier that prevents individuals from reaching out for HIV testing and speaking openly about HIV related issues in the workplace.
- Difficulty for LGBTQ+ individuals to acquire or maintain a loving relationship.

Our Response

We bring the voice of PLHIV to citizens in Korea through online and offline activities, such as the screening of movies or drama series. Our story not only focuses on HIV but also life as an PLHIV. Through storytelling, the PRIDE Film Project helps alleviate general public's S&D towards HIV.

The Challenge

Hsinchu City has more overseas workers than any other cities in Taiwan. These workers are young, educated, well-paid, but lack easy access to accurate information about HIV prevention and testing.

Our Response

We provided online and in-person services to workers coming from the Philippines and Indonesia, the two largest foreign language speaking groups in Taiwan.

We created YouTube videos in these languages showing how to use HIV self-test kits, and where to access resources from local community groups.

The Results

4

outreaches per year at foreign worker dormitories to provide HIV prevention education and promote available services in the local community, reaching over 1000 people.

Over 2000

viewers recorded on YouTube since 2022, increasing community knowledge on how to use HIV self-test kits and reducing HIV stigma.

Over 300

HIV tests were distributed in GisneyLand Hsinchu Office. Four HIV infection cases were identified and successfully linked to medical treatment and support services.

Our Story

Even with English information provided by the government and NGOs, most clients still prefer receiving information in their mother tongue. GisneyLand aims to provide more diverse language services in the future.

The Challenge

Relating the story of PLHIV to the wider society is a challenge. Due to HIV stigma, there is an additional barrier to uplifting the voices for PLHIV, but it is essential to building self-esteem and reducing internalized stigma.

Our Response

We utilized various platforms (story website, Facebook, Instagram, YouTube, and Podcast) to publish HIV/AIDS-related stories, drug user-related life stories, videos, resources, and advocacy.

We also developed a theatre performance from stories and experiences that we have gathered from over the years. PLHIV were then invited to engage in a live discussion with the audience.

Access To Quality Health And Life Programs For PLHIV, Youth, Vulnerable Populations, Transgender And High-risk Behaviors In Baluchistan, Pakistan

The Challenge

Due to strong influence of religious, tribal, cultural & traditional beliefs, there is heavy stigma towards PLHIV due to how the virus is transmitted - sexual behavior or known as zinah. As zinah is strictly prohibited in Islam & our culture, at risk populations tend to avoid HIV testing, screening; receive treatment, prevention or disclosure of their HIV status.

Our Response

To improve access to quality health through an integrated approach by providing clients timely response, links, guidance, treatment, counseling and referral services. To support PLHIV, youth, vulnerable populations and those engaged in high-risk behaviors to get access to public and private qualified healthcare service providers with HIV testing, linkage to care and retention in care. In less than 15 months, this project generated a 40% increase in access, demand, and supply of quality healthcare through the engagement of HCP, communities, stakeholders, and the youth in the district of Quetta.

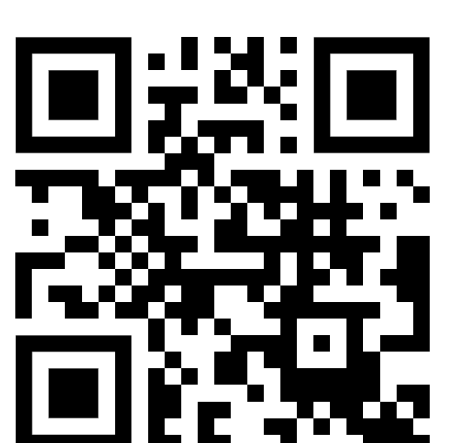

The Challenge

Communities affected and infected with HIV continue to face stigma and discrimination (S&D). The level of S&D becomes more severe when people in the at-risk populations are HIV-positive.

Our Response

Through 320 Care and Support Center (CSC) spread across 28 states and 4 union territories in India, we provided HIV care and support services to PLHIV across the country. To address S&D, a grievance redressal system was established at each CSC and all incidences of S&D were recorded/documentated. Victims were also linked to the national toll-free helpline 1097 and referred to the Ombudsman as required as per the HIV/AIDS Act 2017.

The Challenge

The Hong Kong media is increasingly aware of LGBTQ, HIV and other gender issues. However, some news reporting could be misleading, perpetuating stereotypes and harm to the community.

Our Response

- We published the LGBTQ Media Reference Guide based on opinions collected from journalist and the community. The guideline provides basic knowledge regarding the LGBTQ and HIV issue, encouraging news reporting in a respectful and accurate manner.
- We also consistently organize workshops for reporters and journalism students as well as monitor news and lobby the media to ensure non-biased reporting.

The Results

ALL

major news outlets in Hong Kong have received our guideline.

Over 1000

of our audience members have been reached through our workshops and university lectures, including reporters and journalism students.



Many biased news article have been amended or removed through our lobbying efforts.

Shades of HIV Law Article 21: HIV Criminalization in Taiwan

The Challenge

Article 21, that criminalizes HIV, has been active since 1990 and several PLHIV have been trailed or exposed to threats due to HIV non-disclosure, exposure or transmission. There is an urgent need to decriminalize HIV.

Our Response

A summary and analysis of the criminalization of HIV non-disclosure, exposure and transmission in Taiwan was done until Dec 31, 2019. An abstract was submitted to AIDS 2020 to systematically present the harm of HIV criminalization.

A seminar was organized with law experts, advocates, physicians and HIV criminalization survivor to make concrete suggestions for decriminalization.

First

time a Taiwanese HIV criminalization survivor shared his experience with the audience in the seminar.

e-poster was presented at AIDS 2020. It was later cited by Taiwan CDC in a presentation for a regulatory amendment to include U=U, to prevent overly broad HIV criminalization.

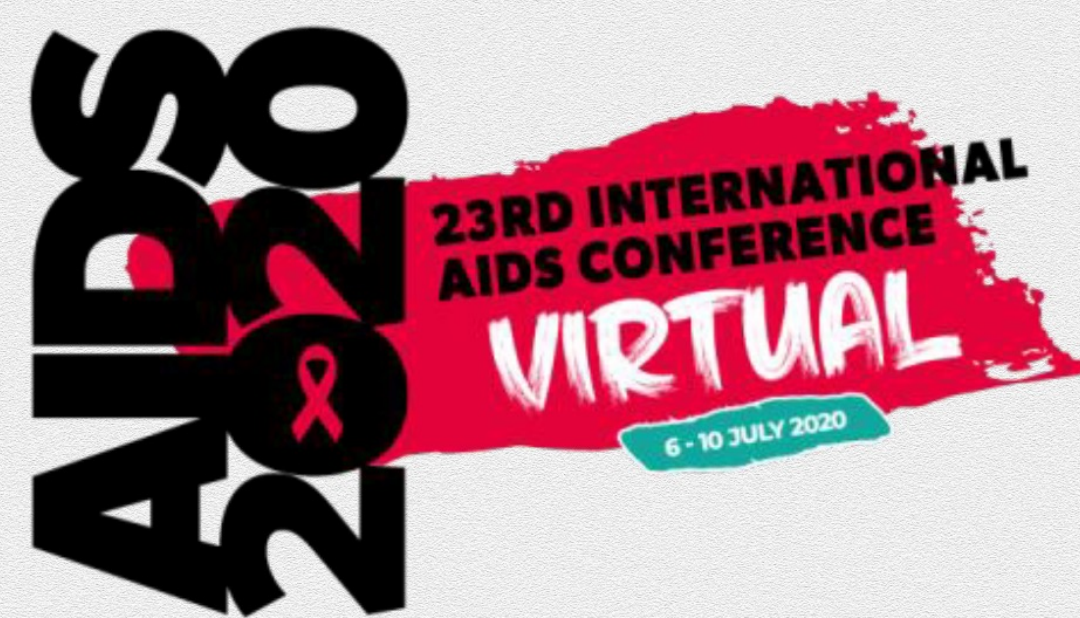

The Challenge

The current medical system does not facilitate for PLWH to provide input or take part in HIV/AIDS clinical trials and research.

Collaboration and cooperation with NGOs to further HIV prevention and expansion of HIV testing to end the HIV epidemic is insufficient.

Our Response

Improve the medical system in Japan:

- Held regular consultations with the government and medical institutions, including with the Ministry of Education and Ministry of Justice;
- Participated in the “HIV test consultation room” commissioned by the local government and in the HIV/AIDS GAP6 consortium;
- Set up a research group and participated in shared research; and
- Contributed to the AIDS Prevention Guidelines.

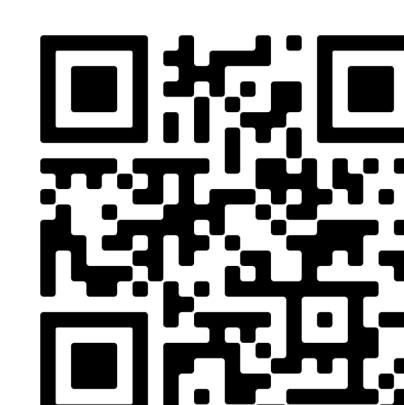

The Challenge

We created and expanded a list of HIV+ friendly clinics, collected information from PLHIV volunteers, and educated and promoted friendly healthcare services via lodging appeals.

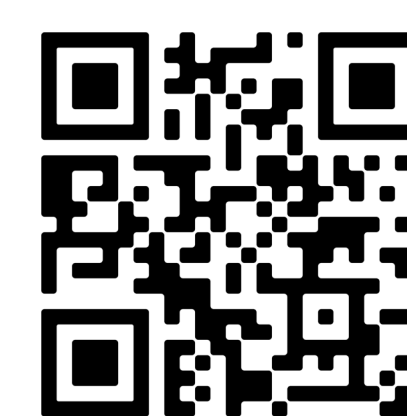

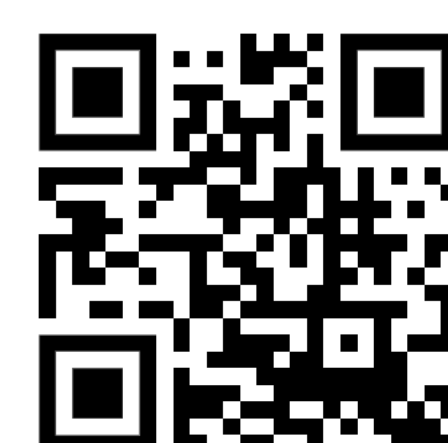

- Many individuals may not have access to adequate information about HIV preventative medication.
- MSM and TGWs in Vietnam are especially vulnerable.

Our Response

- This project seeks to increase awareness and the adoption of HIV prevention, targeting at-risk MSM and TGW populations in Vietnam to ultimately reduce the spread of HIV and improve the health outcomes of these communities.
- The main routes of communication were through online (Facebook Fan Page) sites and offline (in-person) events.

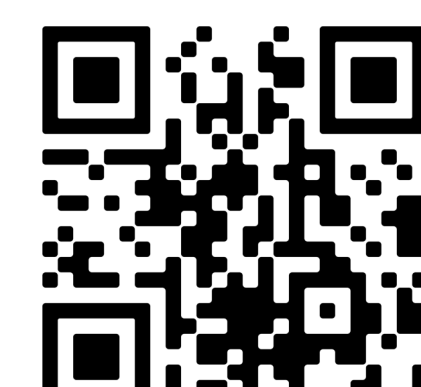

The Challenge

There is a lack of awareness on HIV prevention among MSM and the transgender population.

Our Response

Raise willingness to test regularly among MSM and the transgender population by assembling online trainings, releasing popular scientific articles and a manual on sexual health for the transgender community. Deepen the target audience's disease knowledge and needs through peer education outreach activities at bars, parks and other venues. Explore innovative & user-friendly HIV testing services.

first manual on sexual health for transgender community was published in China; 3 transgender AIDS prevention interventions.

Old Outreach Training For Healthcare Providers And Outreach Workers In Indonesia For Adolescents

23 – 25 Jan 2023



The Challenge

- HCPs and outreach workers are aware of the different needs of the young key populations. However, there is a lack of resources for Train-for-Trainers activities.
- Ageism was observed during the training as the trainers are far younger than the participants.

Our Response

Responding to the service gap, training activities were organized across Indonesia for those who provided outreach services to the young key population, with focus on how to provide HIV friendly services:

- Administrative barriers and stigma faced by the youth under 18 years old in accessing HIV test services were observed.
- Awareness around the new Ministry of Health regulation (Number, 23/2022, article 24), which allows youth under 18 years old to access HIV test services, was raised.

The Results

20

healthcare providers and outreach workers from 10 different districts were trained on how to reach and serve the youth under 18 years old in accessing HIV services.

More than 18

year old clients can now access HIV services thanks to the outreach workers who socialized the issue after their training and improve the outreach regulation of their institutions.

3 months

of online coordination meetings (once every 2 weeks) were held following the training to monitor its efficacy. Barriers in current outreach regulation, such as absence of Standard Operating Procedures, were identified.

Our Story

“Even though the new MoH regulation allows youth under 18 years old to access the HIV services, we still need a national standard of technical instructions from the MoH and an SOP from each District Health Office in Indonesia to support the implementation.”

The Challenge

Healthcare professionals (HCP) may lack training in communicating sensitively to marginalized communities. This can result in poor care quality, negative attitudes and behaviors from HCP, and a lack of confidentiality and privacy in service delivery.

Our Response

We developed an HIV sensitivity training workshop to provide HCP with the communication skills and sensitivity training required to provide high-quality, sensitive, and inclusive care to PLHIV at NCID. The workshop covered gender identity, sexuality, sex work, drug use, and HIV and was facilitated by community groups with experience and expertise in these fields. The workshop aimed for 30 participants from various family groups affiliated with the organisation. Small group work and learning was used, with each group including learners and facilitators representing key populations.

The Results

97%

of the participants agreed that the workshop had increased their understanding of the importance of sensitive communication towards PLHIV.

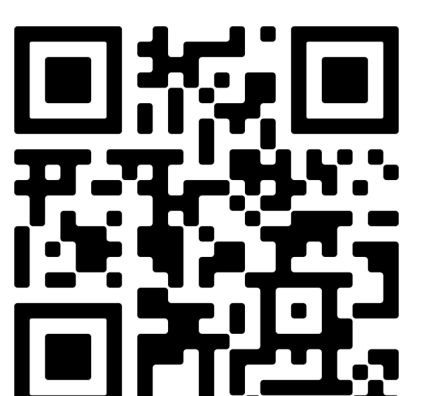

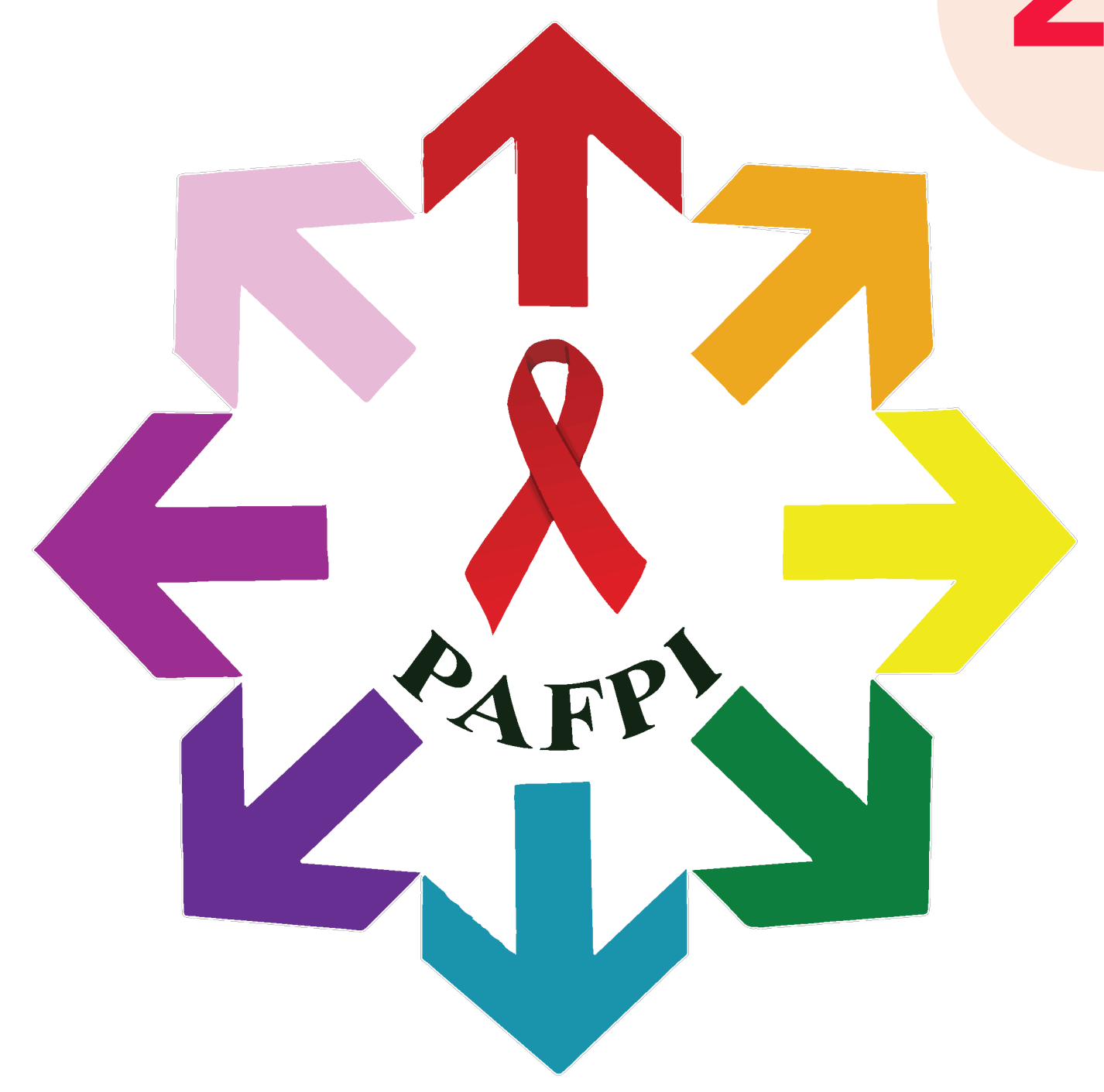

The Challenge

There is a lack of local response in adolescence sexual reproductive health in Geographically Isolated and Disadvantage Areas (GIDA) in the Philippines.

Our Response

Three areas were selected as project sites for collaboration with local officials, regional, city, and municipality level health offices to establish and institutionalize the Local AIDS Council and Adolescent Sexual Reproductive Health ordinances in the selected three project sites.

There is also training for selected Peer Educators for HIV related education.

The Results

3

local AIDS Councils, 3 Sexual Reproductive Health Ordinances, in Virac Catanduanes, Baybay City, Leyte, Alabel, Sarangani Province were involved in this project.

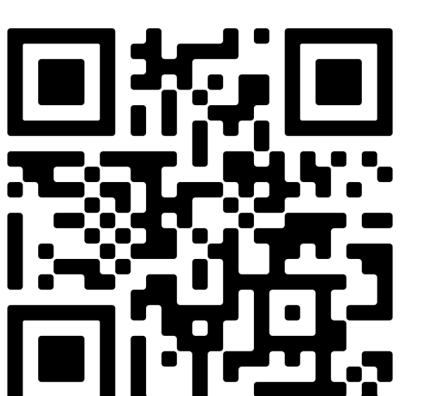

The Challenge

Low awareness of U=U, PrEP and PEP within the PLHIV community. Building a medical and health system that is friendly to PLHIV.

Our Response

Organized 8 community-based partner trainings to train 284 people. Optimized the communication mechanism between medical institutions and PLHIV.

The Results

284

people trained through 8 trainings focused on U=U, PrEP and PEP. Over 1/3 of attendees reported a positive change in attitude towards PLHIV and were willing to befriend them.

3000

people received HIV and syphilis testing through outreach, reagent delivery, onsite testing and other formats.



by establishing a dialogue between PLHIVs, disease control centers and medical institutions, the barrier for more PLHIV to receive free medication has been lifted, making it easier for non-infected individuals in this city to obtain treatment medication.

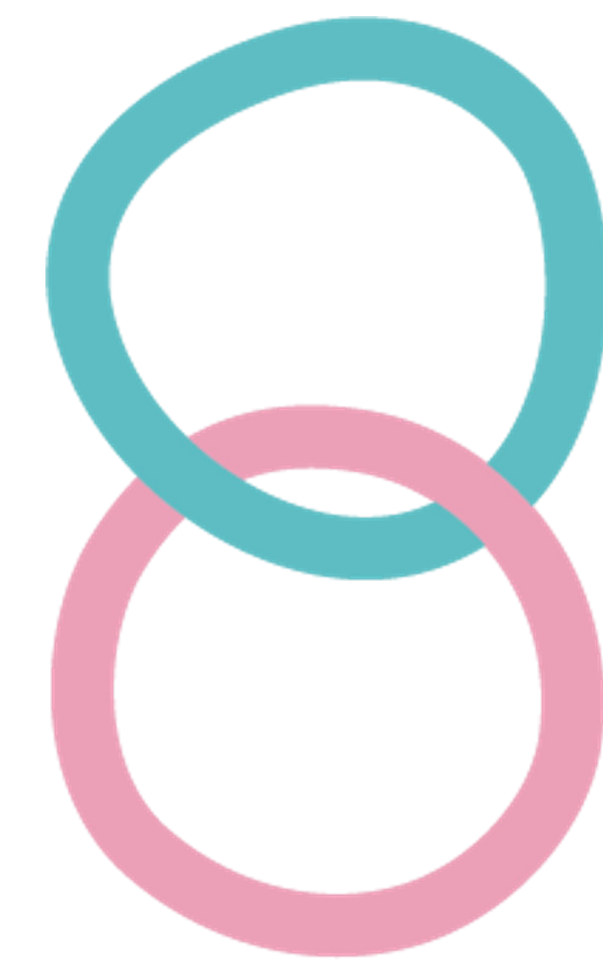

The Challenge

“Sex” remains taboo in Hong Kong and local youths are exposed to an alarming increase of sexual harassment and risky online sexual behaviors. Sexuality Education in HK is insufficient, and most programs adopted a “deficit-based” approach.

Our Response

Comprehensive Sexuality Education

- We tailor-made our sexuality education group/class-based programs to meet the needs of students in different school grades. We also utilized different online platforms to offer evidence-based, positive and youth-centered sexual education.
- Other than sexual health promotion, we create safe and inclusive spaces for everyone to talk about sexuality openly and empower young people to reconnect with their sexuality and make informed decisions.

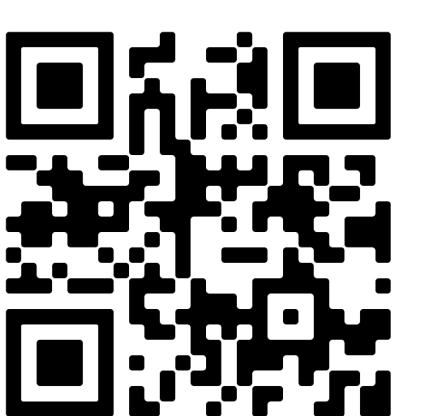

The Challenge

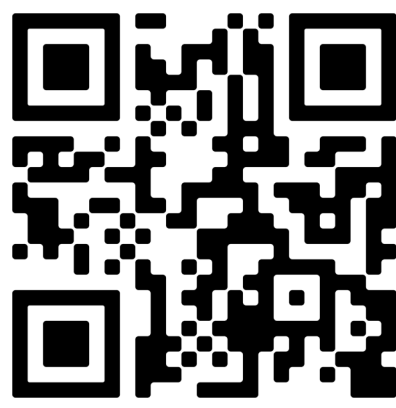

Providing Testing Opportunities For MSM Using Digital Dispenser In Tokyo
Mar 2022 – Mar 2023



The Challenge

Due to COVID-19, HIV/ STD testing in Japan decreased significantly. The expansion of testing is an urgent issue, particularly among MSMs in Japan, who have a higher rate of late diagnosis compared to other countries and where infections are concentrated.

Our Response

HIV test kits have been successfully distributed to MSM in the UK using digital dispensers. Research studies have shown that this approach is also highly acceptable in Japan.

Thus, AKTA introduced a UK dispenser in 2020, and developed a Japanese version in 2022, to distribute HIV and syphilis postal screening/testing kits to MSM who come to Gay Town in Shinjuku 2-chome.

The Results

PHASE 1

- 72 test kits distributed.
- 1 HIV+ case (2.0%).
- 9 syphilis positive cases (18%).
- Trial distribution in Shinjuku 2-chome Community Center akta using UK dispenser.

PHASE 2

- 323 kits distributed.
- 6 HIV+ cases (1.6%).
- 65 syphilis positive cases (17.3%).
- Full distribution at the Community Centre akta. 64.6% out of all kits were received using this dispenser.

PHASE 3

- 40 kits distributed.
- 1 HIV+ case (3.7%).
- 5 syphilis positive cases (18.5%).
- Development of a Japanese dispenser and trial distribution of test kits at a Shinjuku 2-chome gay club event.

The Challenge

Beyond medical care, PLHIV have little opportunity to receive differentiated health services to support their quality of life.

Our Response

1,000 newly diagnosed PLHIV received case management services at least twice. 110 aged PLHIV took part in community outreach, online and in-hospital accompanying treatment services. 60 women of childbearing age received free screening for breast & cervical cancers. A WeChat platform named “WHO看WHO健康” with over 12,000 subscribers was successfully launched.

The Challenge

In Korea, MSM represent 43.7% of PLHIV from 1985 to 2021. However, it is expected that the actual number of PLHIV among MSM is higher. Test rates are particularly low in regional cities where access to HIV testing is lower.

Our Response

- iSHAP traveled to five regional cities to provide HIV/STI tests for MSM and MTF through events in gay bars and hospitality staff from the MSM community.
- iSHAP traveled to 10 regional cities to educate people about HIV prevention and test, what to do after testing positive for HIV, and the rights of PLHIV. Education was conducted by MSM trainers.
- iSHAP traveled to five regional cities with low accessibility to HIV tests to distribute free oral HIV test and increase self-testing rates.

The Results

391

individuals were tested in six events held across five regions. The 8 HIV+ and 27 Syphilis+ detected have been connected to treatment.

681

individuals were educated with accurate HIV knowledge and information through 11 sessions in 10 regions.

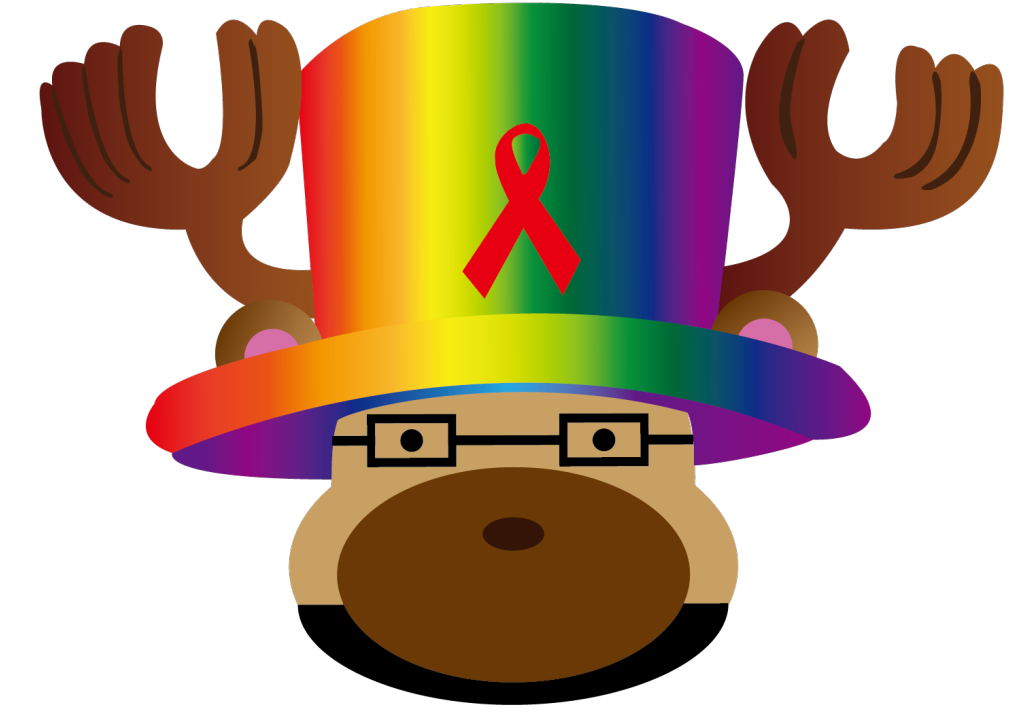

The Challenge

There is a misunderstanding among PLHIV that taking HIV medication will lead to weight gain, resulting in inconsistent uptake to maintain one's "figure".

Some PLHIV are isolated and have little interaction with the community.

Our Response

We created a 90-day program to promote the ideal lifestyle with 6 HIV case managers from Taoyuan General Hospital. They led 6 teams (60 PLHIV) to compete in 3 categories:

- Diet – eat smart with a metabolism physician
- Sports – exercise with a professional coach
- Mental – meet more people through activities at MentalGHouse

A full body check-up and mental health survey were conducted before and after program intervention to track the changes.

The Results

Over 60%

of participants demonstrated significant weight loss (-6.5kg) and waistline reduction (-12cm) after adopting a healthier lifestyle.

PLHIV were educated on how to achieve their ideal lifestyle, becoming advocates for a HIV stigma-free society.

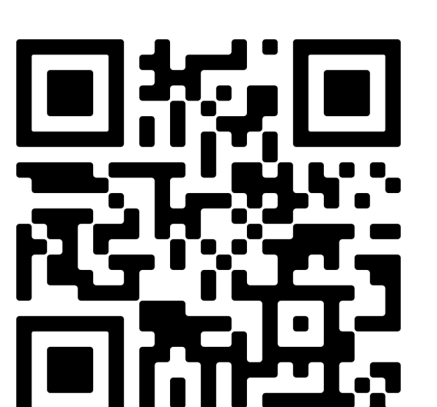

The Challenge

With the current standard treatment initiation procedure, patients may wait up to eight weeks before medications are started. Anxiously waiting patients are concerned over costs, side effects and psychosocial impacts, which can deter a person from seeking treatment.

Our Response

SameDayART@NUH aims to start Antiretroviral Therapy (ART) on the day of the first visit to Multidisciplinary Infectious Diseases Clinic (MIDC) for patients whose reactive screening test was done earlier than 96 hours prior to the first visit. This included patients who may have been diagnosed much earlier but were never successfully linked to care.

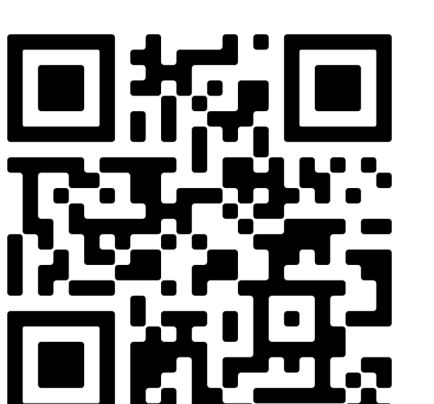

The Challenge

Young people in Vietnam are at an increased risk of STIs such as syphilis, gonorrhea, chlamydia, and HIV but have limited access to clear and engaging sexual health information and services.

Co-designed by USAID/PATH STEPS, Vietnam Ministry of Health, Ministry of Education, and youth leaders, Prevention4U (where “U” stands for both “you” and “university”) is a national education campaign targeting high school and university students.

Our Response

Prevention4U targets educational settings through talk shows with clinical experts, interactive edutainment games focused on safe sex and sexual health, integration with sex-ed programs at schools, booth exhibitions, and other activities where students can interact with community influencers and staff from community-based clinics and receive HIV testing, HIV prevention counseling, and on-site referral for other services. The campaign also runs across online platforms and leverages a network of ambassadors and a dynamic Facebook page blending informative and humorous content derived by youth to motivate viewers to seek HIV prevention information and services.

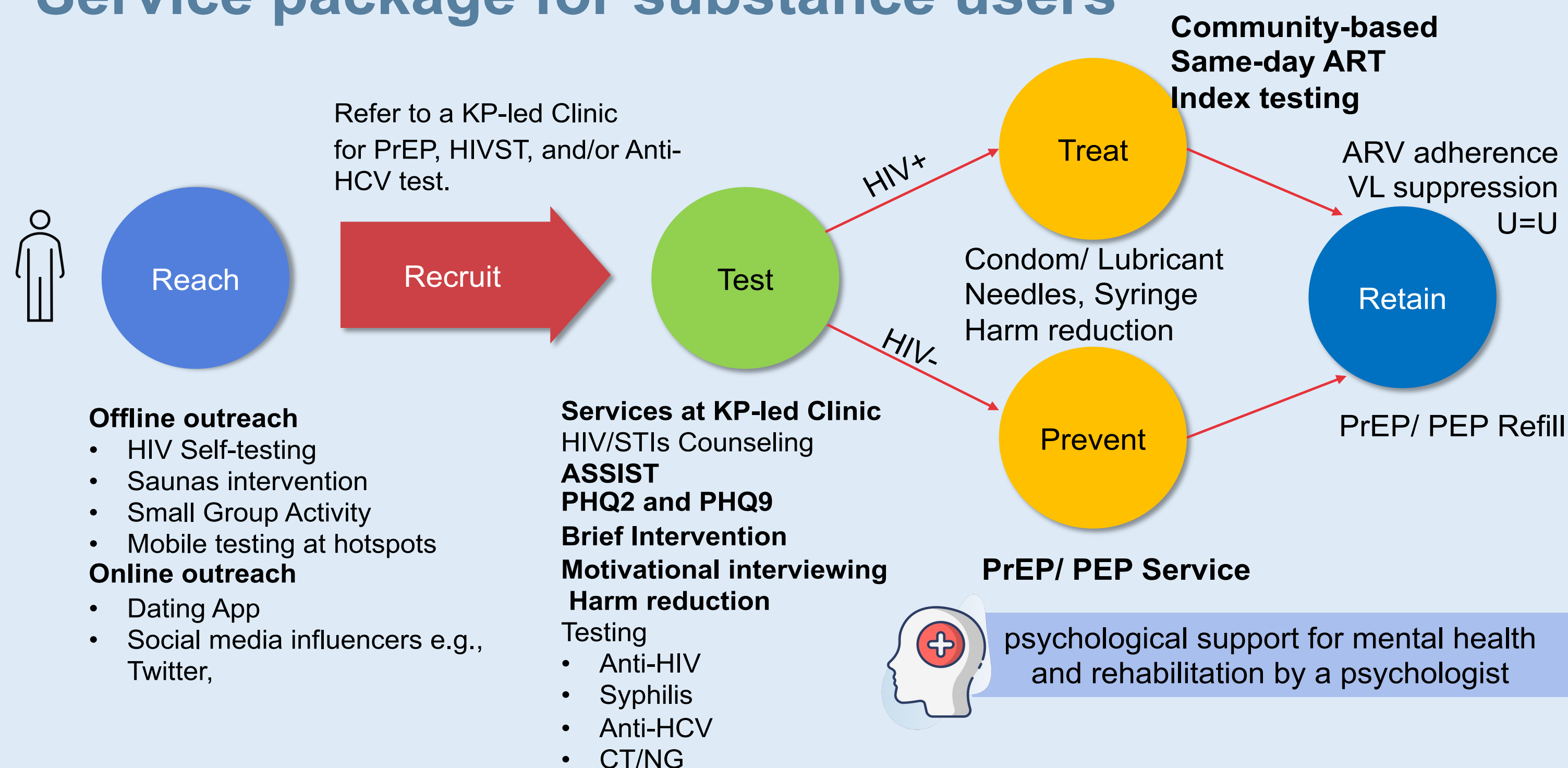

Peer support group: A monthly HIV peer-led, 6-person group meeting, encouraged participants to express challenges in their lives and find solutions together.

PLWHA-Women Empower camp: A 20-participant annual event to increase participants' health knowledge and impart methods to overcome their trauma.

Podcast: Three podcast episodes were curated to share the stories of women living with HIV to increase the public understanding of the population.

There is hostility and discrimination against people who practice chemsex. As PLHIV age, funding and support for the chemsex sub-community should be consistent.

Our Response

Established the "HERO" (Healing, Empowerment, Recovery Of chemsex) Community in 2017 and transformed it into "Héros - the future space and clinic" in 2022 for the community. "Héros" provides holistic and long-term care resources, including HIV support for the chemsex community. This clinic is proof of concept for the government to invest in sustainable funding and secure commercial cooperation to support the community.

The Challenge

There is a lack of services in Singapore targeted at men who have sex with men who use drugs, and who are at risk of acquiring, or living with HIV.

Our Response

This project aims to empower social workers and those at risk or are living with HIV on the latest HIV science, as well as best professional and peer support practices for treating such vulnerable communities to reduce HIV incidence, and to empower communities.

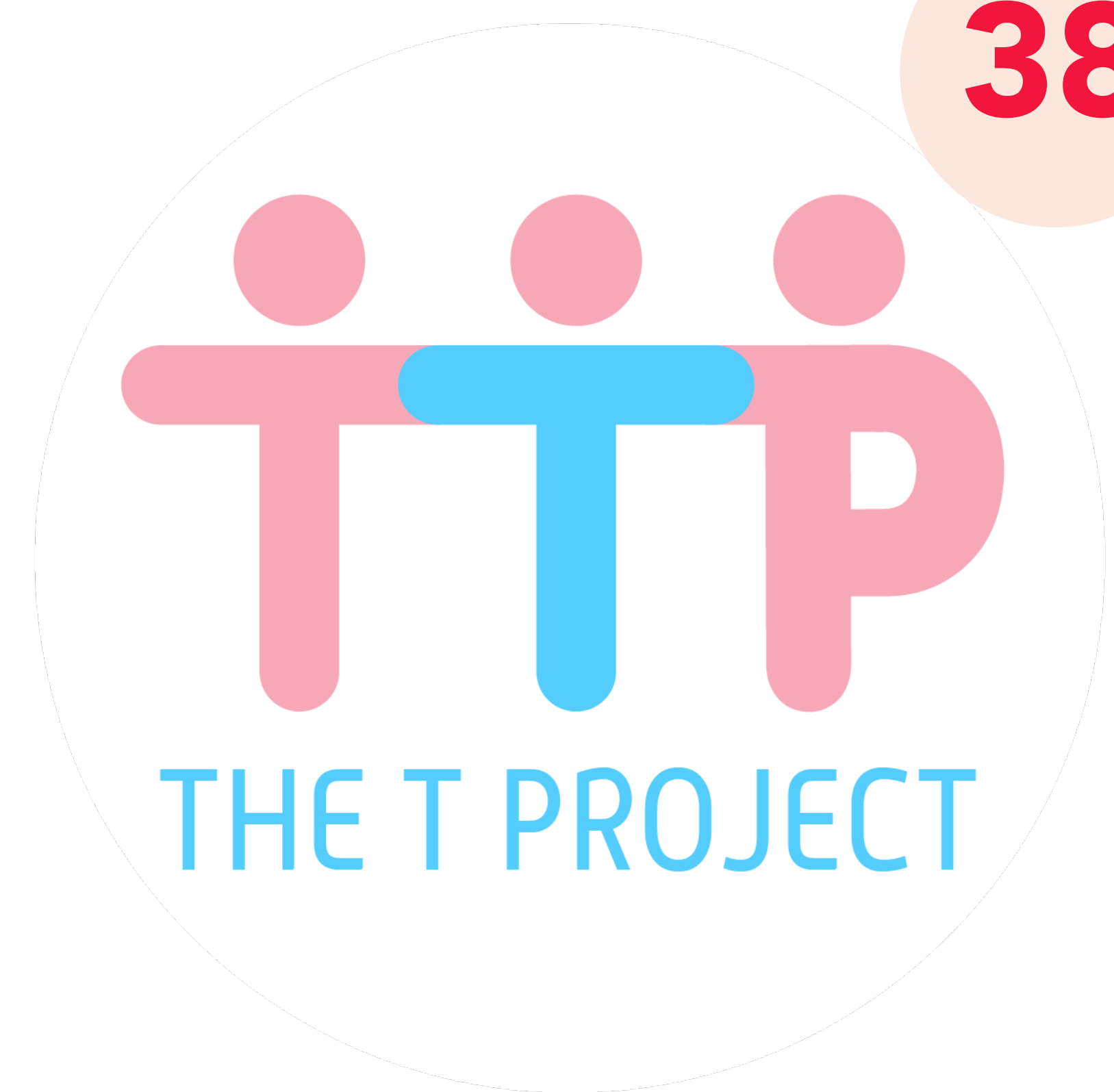

Our clients are largely from the transgender community. The lack of targeted outreach to this community means insufficient sexual health knowledge, feeling unsafe or even fear of greater stigmatization when asked to be tested for HIV.

We collaborated with Action for AIDS Singapore to conduct HIV testing for our clients. We received positive response from the community, particularly from those who are younger, as they appreciate the initiative to create a safe and non-judgmental space for testing.

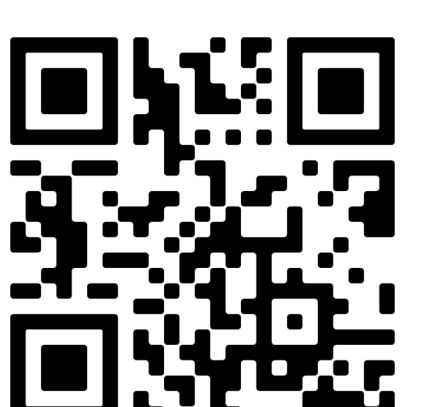
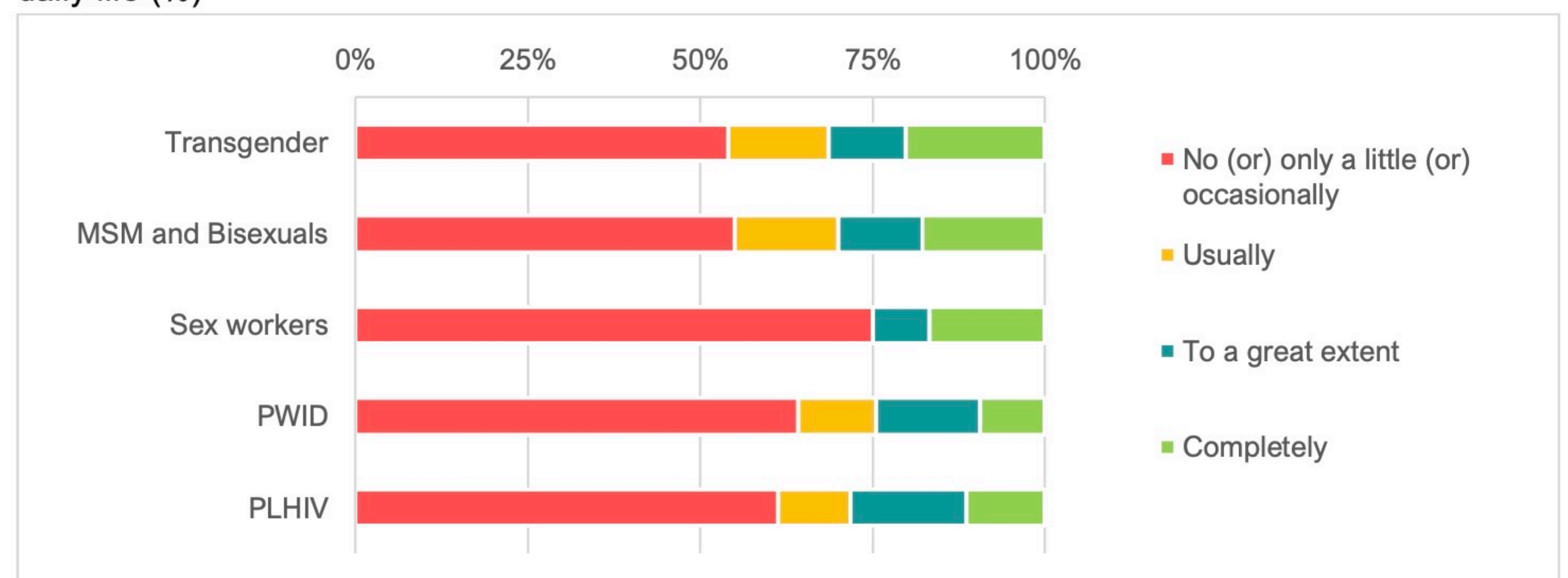

- Train social organizations and build their capacity in program evaluation and impact measurement;
- Carry out commissioned work to evaluate social programs; and
- Develop ease-to-read and use frameworks and tools for SOs' own implementation.

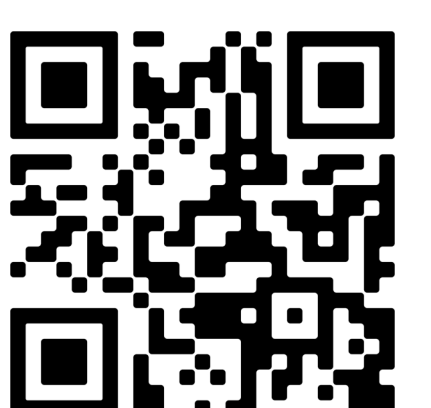

The Challenge

Individuals in underserved communities may face barriers accessing care services due to conditions such as poor quality of service, stigma surrounding HIV or hepatitis, or a shortage of healthcare providers or medicines needed to manage these conditions.

Our Response

Community-led monitoring (CLM) is a process that involves community members living with HIV and viral hepatitis in monitoring the quality of health services provided to them. The result of this process is collected and visualized in the CLM dashboard which provides an at-a-glance view of the service provider's performance in various areas. It can help address the need for quality improvement by providing real-time data and insights into key indicators and trends, which can be used to identify improvement areas and foster a culture of data-driven decisions by healthcare providers.

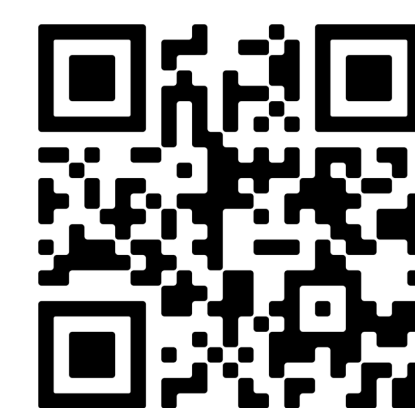

QSID In HIV Care: Reducing Stigma And Discrimination Through Quality Improvement In SAIL Clinics
Jan – Apr 2023



The Challenge

No established performance measurement to determine the stigma and discrimination experience in healthcare settings.

Our Response

SHIP employs the Quality Improvement model to enhance client satisfaction and experiences within the context of HIV service delivery. By continuously evaluating the satisfaction and experiences of clients across three SAIL Clinics, SHIP has developed a comprehensive monitoring tool that provides valuable insights. These insights have played a pivotal role in optimizing HIV service delivery, leading to targeted improvements such as reduced waiting times, immediate and clear responses to client inquiries, and the establishment of a welcoming and friendly environment. Through this research-driven approach, SHIP actively incorporates client perspectives to reduce stigma and ensure the highest standard of care.

The Results

Sail Clinic Makati

- Clients experienced long waiting times due to a high volume of visitors.
- The percentage of clients reporting stigma and discrimination from HCPs varied across months: 15.83% in January, 36.26% in February, 0% in March, and 1.49% in April.
- SAIL Makati continues their progress in addressing waiting time concerns and maintain their focus on creating a welcoming environment that puts clients at ease.

Sail Clinic Cavite

- Clients reported a non-welcoming and unfriendly experience during their visits.
- The percentage of clients experiencing stigma and discrimination from HCPs was high: 94.90% in January and 95.83% in February. This decreased to 0.88% in March.
- SAIL Cavite has taken steps to address stigma and discrimination concerns, including through continuous staff training, awareness campaigns, and regular monitoring of client experiences.

Sail Clinic Calamba

- Clients faced delays and unclear responses to inquiries made through the clinic's official website, social media, and during interviews.
- The percentage of clients reporting stigma and discrimination from healthcare workers varied: 39.26% in January, 31.15% in February, and 2.70% in March.
- SAIL Calamba has made significant progress in improving communication with clients and providing timely and clear responses to inquiries.

Positive Treatment, Colorful Life
Nov 2021 – Jan 2023



The Challenge

Negative emotions can result in a PLHIV treating their diagnosis passively. This not only affects treatment effectiveness but could result in a decreased quality of life should negative emotions persist overtime.

Our Response

Recruited 18 PLHIV volunteers to lead peer support groups and group activities, such as learning treatment knowledge and skills, sharing experiences in maintaining family members and partnerships, and discussing current and future life topics. Collected and amplified stories of PLHIV through social media and speaking opportunities to radiate the positive energy of "positive treatment, colorful life".

The Results

1485

PLHIV and 78 of their family members in Chengdu participated in the campaign.

98%

of newly diagnosed PLHIV started treatment within a month, with 97.7% achieving viral load suppression.

Exploring U=U Awareness, Internalized Homophobia And Depression In Korean HIV Community

The Challenge

In Korea, the awareness of U=U among the Korean public is less than 3%. Stigma against PLHIV has led to a high incidence of depression and suicide attempts among PLHIV.

Our Response

This project aims to investigate the relationship between U=U awareness, internalized homophobia, and depression among 199 South Korean PLHIV.

The Results

199

PLHIVs were recruited for this survey, 81.4% being MSM.

72%

of respondents had extensive knowledge about U=U.

50%

of PLHIV learned about U=U from an online HIV community bulletin board, rather than from medical experts.

Our Story

PLHIV that are well-aware of U=U reported better mental health, were less likely to have suicidal ideations or attempts. However, internalized homophobia was prevalent regardless of U=U awareness.

Our Response

The project is committed to changing the lives of PLHIV by responding to their needs in medical care, identity, social support, social adaptation, self fulfillment, etc. The project also supports PLHIV to reduce their psychological pressure and have the courage to rebuild their life and relationships.

The Results

5000

people reported reduced discrimination against infected individuals after receiving project services and related information.

10000

people received HIV-related knowledge through online channels.

40000

people were tested for HIV after receiving knowledge from the campaign.

Our Story

One attendee wrote on the feedback form, “It was like atonement.” This piece of feedback was a testimony of our gains, and showed that efforts paid off and difficulties can be overcome.

The Challenge

There is a lack of focus on the social determinants of health, patient-centered care, and patient-reported outcomes in the Singapore health system.

Our Response

We organized two scientific meetings (2018 and 2020), webinars, and a series of talks promoting community-based participatory research, social determinants of health, and other topics on behavioral health and patient-centered care. We hope that promoting conversations and interdisciplinary collaborations on behavioral health can spur approaches to center patients in the Singapore HIV response.

The Results

211

participants attended our interdisciplinary scientific meetings in 2018 (in-person) and 2020 (virtual).

864

attendees recorded for our scientific meetings and webinars organized from October 2018 to May 2023, involving researchers, policymakers, practitioners, and trainees in behavioral health.

3

scientific events held on HIV. These workshops focused on Community Based Participatory Approaches (featuring Prof. Judith Auerbach), HIV behavioral science, and Singapore's SOCRATES cohort.

Our Story

The "Nothing About Us Without Us": Community Engagement in HIV Research workshop saw a range of behavioral health practitioners and researchers learn from the experiences and innovations in HIV behavioral sciences.

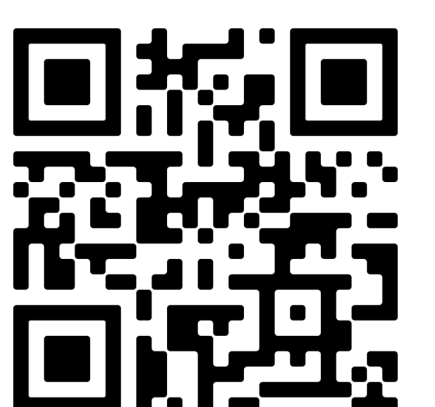

Emergency Response To COVID-19 Among
Transgender, Male And Female Sex Workers In
Thailand**

The Challenge

Around 200,000 sex workers are estimated to be working in Thailand. The shock from the COVID-19 lockdown and reduction in tourism left many without income. Furthermore, there were no interventions from the government to provide welfare support.

Our Response

Situation analysis – 91% of sex workers lost their job/income and 75% did not have sufficient funds to cover their daily living expenses.

- A foodbank program.
- Employment training and psychosocial support.
- Support for writing proposals to seek additional grants.
- Community-led COVID-19 screening.
- Masks and hygiene/sanitation education.
- Set-up a COVID-19 fund for sex workers, supported by public donations and the sale of T-shirts.

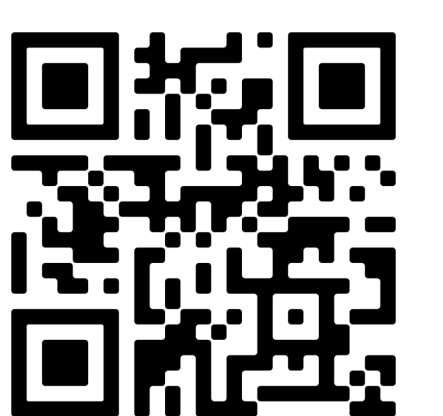

The Challenge

PLHIV in the MSM & Transgender community were heavily impacted due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Of the 800 in the community, 75% do not come from Bali; loss of jobs even forced some to return to their home villages.

Our Response

- Provided basic food assistance and housing rental subsidies to PLHIV for the first 3 months;
- Provided training on how to manage and run an independent business;
- Provided venture capital assistance; and
- Supported the development of economic activity to keep them productive.

The Results

500

community members had their basic needs covered for the first three months.

100

selected community members were trained to increase their capacity and sustain their business.

50

selected community members received training and free venture capital to start new businesses.
